My wife, Toni, and I met Carole Adams in October 2002 when we began volunteering at Piedras Blancas Light Station (PBLS). Joined by a team of terrific volunteers, we were excited and eager to attack the first restoration program - the extensive removal of non-native plants at PBLS. As we started to remove tons (literally!) of invasive ice plant and a variety of other non-native plants, we quickly realized that Carole was a very diligent, determined and energetic worker who was always focused on stewardship. This native plant restoration program was the first of many that Carole was instrumental in developing, coordinating and accomplishing from 2002 to 2016. It was the start of a fantastic volunteer program spearheaded by Carole and she provided supportive leadership, guidance, boundless energy and enthusiasm, and a "we can make a positive difference" attitude. She welcomed volunteers with a warm hug and always worked with us on the varying projects while demonstrating and promoting a spirit of "teamwork" and stewardship. Carole devoted 14 years of outstanding volunteer work to restoring, preserving and protecting the spectacular light station, its significant history and environmental resources.

In 2004, Carole was honored by the U.S. Department of the Interior with the Bureau of Land Management's Volunteer of

the Year Award for "Making a Difference on the Public Lands." There are so many projects, jobs and accomplishments in which Carole played a significant role and made possible. These include: coordinating the native plant restoration program; developing public and 4th grade school tours; editing The Beacon newsletter; developing and maintaining the PBLS Resource Library and research materials which includes an extensive collection of historical documents; recruiting/training college student volunteers; documenting and cataloging the accomplishments of volunteers, BLM staff and interns; establishing and fostering helpful communication with neighboring light stations;

maintaining an extensive collection of PBLS architectural diagrams, charts and documents; co-authoring the impressive Point Piedras Blancas

book; conducting initial and refresher volunteer training.

Carole wasn't all work and no play...she also added a special amount of fun, humor and comic vitality to the PBLS volunteer experience. I vividly recall how excited and happy she was to lead her tour groups in singing the lyrics of "Row, Row, Row Your Boat" in the lighthouse to showcase the beautiful acoustics of the tower. How could we forget when she and several other volunteers treated us to their lip syncing conga line rendition of "I Want To Marry A Lighthouse Keeper" at our fundraising event at the Hearst Castle Theater. Many joined in the fun conga line that was lead by nobody but Carole. And how can we not remember Carole at the Cambria Vets Hall at our community Halloween "Monster Bash" event...there she was in her wicked witch of Cambria costume, warts and all. COOKING AT THE LIGHTHOUSE

Catherine Maude Rogers was born in 1891 in the San Carpoforo mountains north of the light station. In 1908, she married Lorin V. Thorndyke, Jr. – oldest son of the longest tenured Head Keeper at Piedras Blancas Light Station, Captain Lorin V. Thorndyke. She kept a book of recipes, some of which were clipped from magazines or newspapers. As the following recipe demonstrates, printing exact baking instructions was not always considered necessary. It was assumed that a competent housewife would know how to cook anything!

Holiday Cake

3/4 C butter 2 C sugar 1 C milk 2 1/2 C flour

3/4 tsp salt

2 tsp baking powder Whites of 4 eggs

1 Tbl grated lemon rind

Cream butter and sugar and mix dry ingredients. Add beaten egg whites, flour and milk and beat hard. Take out one-third of this mixture and add:

1 1/2 tsp cinnamon 1/2 C citron 1 tsp allspice 1 C raisins

Bake this mixture in one layer; bake other mixture in two layers. Use the spice layer in the center, with this filling between layers:

1 C shelled walnuts 2 bottles vanilla

1 pound confectioner's sugar

Make an icing of confectioner's sugar and orange juice for the outside of the cake. Decorate with nuts and dates, if desired.

September marks the end of BLM's fiscal year. This is when we look at the past year's accomplishments and examine our goals for the next year. Public visitation at the light station has been a huge priority for BLM from the beginning of our management of the Light Station in 2001, and 2016 is no exception. We have accommodated over 6,600 visitors this year so far! The only way this has been possible is through the unwavering help of our volunteers.

Although we haven't completed any large construction projects this year, we have been busy behind the scenes. There has been progress on the seismic retrofit plans for the Fog Signal Building and lighthouse, the replica entrance gate design and construction has begun and the water tower/communications tower project is in the final stages. We should see a lot of physical progress on many of these projects in 2017.

2016 offered new opportunities for people to visit the light station. We had a photography tour, an open house self-guided tour for Jack's Helping Hand, and three very popular hike-in tours. These new tours have allowed visitors to experience the light station in ways they have not been able to in the past and we plan on continuing this trend in 2017.

Soon we will embark on a planning effort that will look at the future of the Piedras Blancas Light Station management. Our current management plan is now almost 10 years old. 

CRITTER CORNER

Peregrine Falcon



If you have been on a tour of the light station, you may have seen an aerie (the nest of a bird of prey) in the large white rock just offshore.

It is home to a pair of Peregrine Falcons that have been nesting at the light station for quite a few years. And if you were very lucky, you spotted Peregrine chicks inside the aerie or adults perched atop the lighthouse keeping a watchful eye.

Peregrine Falcons are found on every continent except Antarctica and prefer wide open spaces. They thrive near coasts where shorebirds are common and they can live up to 17 years in the wild. Peregrines prey on other birds in mid-flight, hunting from above and dropping into a steep dive or stoop that can reach speeds up to 200 mph. Our resident falcons may be seen all year, but are most visible during spring and summer.

HAVE YOU SEEN OUR WEBCAM?

Since it was installed last year, many visitors have written to say how much they enjoy the live 270 degree view from the light station. Depending on the time of year, you may see elephant seals lounging on the beach, waves crashing on rocks, flowers in bloom, and beautiful sunsets. It's easily accessible from our website!

PIEDRAS BLANCAS LIGHT STATION TOURS

Tours are offered year-round on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays. From June 15 through August 31, tours are offered daily except Wednesdays and Sundays. There are no tours on federal holidays. Tours last about 2 hours and include the historic Piedras Blancas lighthouse and support buildings along with a half mile interpretive trail that provides spectacular ocean views and opportunities to view wildlife. Meet at the former Piedras Blancas Motel located 1.5 miles north of the light station at 9:45 AM.
