# LIGHT STATION CAPTURED BY INTERNATIONAL SPACE STATION



Thanks to the recent flights of SpaceX Crew Dragon and the 50th Anniversary of the Apollo 11 mission, there has been a renewed interest in space travel. For the last 20 years the ISS has been flying 25,000 miles above the Earth. This photo was taken in 2008. You can see submerged reefs, the sandy ocean bottom, and Highway 1 snaking along the coast. Unlike most parts of California, our stretch of coastline remains virtually unchanged in the last twelve years or for the last 50 years for that matter. ## PEOPLE FROM THE PAST: L.V. THORNDYKE


Lorin V. Thorndyke was the longest serving Principal Keeper at Piedras Blancas Light Station, 1879-1906. Thorndyke replaced the first Principal Keeper, Stephen Morse, on August 19, 1879.

Information obtained from Lighthouse Friends website, and the U.S Lighthouse Society, tells us that Thorndyke began his lighthouse service career in 1875 as Second Assistant at Cape Mendocino. Through a series of transfers, he quickly moved up the ladder to Principal Keeper.

Cape Mendocino 1875-1877 - Second Assistant

Año Nuevo 1878-1879 - First Assistant
Point Bonita 1879 - First Assistant
Point Piedras Blancas 1879-1906 - Principal Keeper

We recently acquired personnel records from National Archives, dated 1904, just after the transfer of lighthouse service from the Department of Treasury to the Department of Commerce. These records enhance our previous knowledge of L.V. Thorndyke.






In Part 1 of the records, Thorndyke states his middle name as "Veazy." Mr. Lorin Veaszy Thorndyke was his full name. L. V. Thorndyke was how he wrote his name in payroll records. He was born January 26, 1839. He listed no other family members as civil servants of the United States Government at that time. However, we know one of his sons (Lorin V. Thorndyke) worked at Trinidad Lighthouse 1900-1901 and at Oakland Harbor Lighthouse 1901-1902. His other son (John Emory Thorndyke) was briefly appointed acting assistant keeper at PBLS in August 1903.

When asked if he was appointed through a civil service examination, he responded, "Appointed before position was classified." His occupation prior to entering civil service was listed as "sailor." His education was listed as "public school." In answer to the question, what special qualifications do you have, he replied, "Tinker." His salary was \$800 a year. His position was considered, "competitive."





Thorndyke's letter of resignation was dated July 11, 1906, and was sent to the Lighthouse Inspector, San Francisco. It is short and to the point: "You will please accept my resignation and send a man to relieve me as soon as possible. Very respectfully, L. V. Thorndyke, Keeper"

His final date of employment was August 31, 1906. He was 40 years old when he became Principal Keeper at PBLS and he served 27 years, resigning at age 67.

Placard to be kept hung up in the sitting-room or main hall of the keeper's dwelling.

DWELLING, TOWER, GROUNDS, BOAT SHEDS, AND ANY AND ALL BULDINGS AND PROPERTY AT LIGHT-HOUSE SITES.

Keepers are required to keep the grounds around the light-house towers, dwellings, and other buildings in their charge, in neat and proper order. Slovenliness will not be tolerated. In case the land is adapted to cultivation, the keepers are expected to cultivate it, and if enclosed to keep the enclosures in good order. The grounds about the house and tower are to be kept free from shrubs, bushes, weeds, old barrels, pieces of plank, boxes, &c., and the yard or immediate surroundings of the buildings must be kept cleared of all such articles, and in good order at all times. These duties are no less incumbent upon the keepers than those prescribed for keeping the light burning, apparatus clean, &c.

Those keepers who exhibit a proper zeal and industry, and who seem to desire to put and keep their grounds in good order by attending to their cultivation and enclosure, &c., will be aided as far as possible by the Light-house Board officers, in effecting necessary improvements upon the premises....

#### COOKING AT THE LIGHTHOUSE

"This is a recipe for Irish Soda Bread that I made for the potluck at Piedras Blancas Lighthouse." - Maryann B. Mullen, BLM Volunteer

## Irish Soda Bread

3 cups all-purpose flour 1/3 cup sugar 3 tsp. baking powder

1 tsp baking soda

1 tsp salt

1 2/3 cups buttermilk

1/4 cup margarine, softened

1 large egg, beaten

2 Tbsp. caraway seeds

1 cup raisins



Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a large bowl mix together flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Stir in buttermilk, margarine and egg; mix well. Add raisins and caraway seeds. Equally divide dough into 2 pieces; place each piece in a greased 9 inch pie pan. ("Cut a cross in the top of each loaf to let the devil out" that is the way I was taught!). Bake until golden brown, 30-40 minutes. Cool before slicing. Makes 2 loaves.

## **CRITTER CORNER**



What's in a howl? Coyotes are smart adaptable canines who help keep the rabbit and rodent populations under control. They are found throughout North America. Their yapping and howling calls are a well known sound associated with the west. People typically overestimate the number of coyotes they hear. Researchers at Texas A&M University played recordings of 1-4 coyotes howling and yipping and asked people to estimate how many individuals they thought they heard. Listeners consistently overestimated the numbers of coyotes by nearly two-fold. The way their howls change pitch and pass through the surrounding environment often sounds as though there are as many as a dozen coyotes howling at once. Group size in most areas is 5-6 adults in addition to pups born that year and urban groups of coyotes are smaller. Typically coyotes howl to communicate with

each other and establish territory and may bark when defending their den or meal. They rarely howl when they have downed prey as that would draw unwanted attention from competing coyotes and predators.

#### MEET THE NATIVES



Sea pink or sea thrift (*Armeria maritima*) can be found in coastal areas across the Northern Hemisphere. Thrift prefers dry, sandy, saline conditions along ocean bluffs, ridges, and exposed grasslands. This compact evergreen perennial grows in low clumps and sends up long stems that support globes of pink pompom flowers. Thrift blooms profusely from spring through summer and grows to 11 inches tall and 4-12 feet wide. It adds a beautiful pop of color along the central coast and bees love it.

Meet at the former Piedras Blancas Motel located 1.5 miles north of the light station at 9:45 AM.
